Optional plan to undergo mandated changes

ASD has been told by the Internal Revenue Service to make mandated changes to its 403(b) retirement savings plan, which is available to all employees. The new regulations will require ASD to be much more involved in the administration of the program.



The district currently acts as a conduit between employees and 39 vendors that offer investment products. Deductions are made from the checks of the enrolled employees and forwarded to the vendors. Those vendors are currently responsible for monitoring the limits and regulations of the plan.

That will change because of the new IRS regulations for tax-sheltered annuity plans like ours, and the **Human Resources Department** expects the number of vendors to be reduced considerably by the Jan. 1 deadline.

On Monday, the **Anchorage School Board** approved a three-year contract with **Woodside Financial Partners** to act as the district's consultant to help make the required 403(b) changes.

"The district's goal is to provide a wide array of competitive investment products, said **Human Resources Director Eric Tollefsen**. "We want to ensure employees will have a good investment selection with minimum fees."

Central teacher trains for PolarTrec



Craig Kasemodel, a Central Middle School science and

was to turn its existing, teacher-run recycling program into a student-run, schoolwide project.

"Our recycling club, made up of K-6 students, purchased a paper recycling bin for every classroom, and we bought large recycling containers for our multi-purpose room," Bodensteiner said. "We now collect plastic bottles, aluminum cans, glass, mixed paper, and plastic film in the MPR. We also updated the recycle bins in the staff lounge and workroom."

Next, the students and teachers created a new area in the teacher workroom for reusable paper, which teachers now use for their one-sided copies. They also crafted tiles to hang permanently above sinks and water fountains reminding people to conserve water.

A "Save Water/Save Electricity" poster contest was held and the top 30 posters were displayed throughout the school. Every classroom and restroom now has posters encouraging people to turn off the lights and to not waste water.

"We also installed a bulletin board to keep students aware of the club's activities and our progress towards the Green Star Award. Our Recycling Club read morning announcements about water conservation and turning off the lights. We also put together a short skit about these topics to perform in classrooms," Bodensteiner said. "And the students created a short movie to teach the student body how to recycle at Susitna."

A mixed paper dumpster from Alaska Waste was rented and all of the school's mixed paper is now collected for recycling each week.

"Our recycling program used to depend on teacher volunteers to collect paper, cans, magazines, and newspaper from the teacher workroom, loading it in their cars, and then transporting it to the recycling center," Bodensteiner said. "Now, a different class is in charge of collecting recycling each week. We also have parent volunteers take the materials to the recycling center each week."

The "Shift into Safety" grant will allow the students to develop educational programs on Alaska's graduated driver's license, what it means to "drive under the influence" of drugs or alcohol and the specifics of seat belt safety. They plan to teach Chugiak students about the many hazards and responsibilities associated with operating a vehicle.

technology teacher, is going on a fantastic voyage and students and teachers can virtually go with him. Kasemodel is one of just 12 teachers chosen from around the nation to participate in the PolarTREC project this year.

PolarTREC is an educational research experience, funded by the U.S. National Science Foundation and managed by the Arctic Research Consortium of the U.S., in which K-12 teachers participate in polar research, working closely with scientists as a pathway to improving science education.

Kasemodel is one of the first teachers to go out on a trip this year. He is heading straight for the Bering Sea as a member of a diverse team of researchers aboard the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Healy in support of the Bering Sea Ecosystem Study and the Bering Sea Integrated Ecosystem Research Program.

He will be documenting late winter ocean conditions, studying biological communities found in sea ice, examining the early spring plankton bloom, and investigating light penetration through open water and ice cover.

Additionally, his team will be examining the seafloor and the predation habits of the walrus.

Kasemodel is receiving training in Fairbanks, and then leaves for Dutch Harbor. He expects to be back at Central on April


