TALK OF THE TOWN

For one Hudson teacher, back-to-school time brings with it an opportunity to share firsthand Arctic experiences with her students. **Anne Farley Schoeffler** has been teaching sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade science at Seton Catholic School since 2003, with an emphasis on problem-solving and investigation skills. She herself put these skills to use during a PolarTREC (Teachers and Researchers

Exploring and Collaborating) expedition in Kangerlussuaq on the west coast of Greenland in June. Farley Schoeffler was one of 15 teachers nationwide selected to be a PolarTREC teacher to spend a month conducting hands-on field research experiences in the polar regions.

Farley Schoeffler, who has a doctorate in linguistics, partnered with researcher **Christine Urbanowicz** of Dartmouth

University to study the interactions between plants and their pollinators (animals that aid in plant reproduction through transporting pollen). The aim of their research was to understand how changes in temperature and precipitation might influence plant-pollinator interactions. These interactions can have global implications since the majority of plants in nature and one-third of all crop plants depend on pollinators to produce fruits and seeds.

"Even in my short time here, I have met representatives of at least eight different universities, five countries and the National Science Foundation, all working on dozens of different types of research," Farley Schoeffler said. "All are challenging themselves to live and work in difficult conditions in order to gain a clearer understanding of how this system works and what implications Arctic changes have for the rest of the globe."

Horton is the director of the rugby program at Kent State University.

Congratulations to 2012 Hudson High School graduate **Leighton Antonio** on his move to Eastern Michigan University, following two successful track seasons at Youngstown State. Antonio was a regional qualifier in the 100-meters and a member of the Horizon League Championship team in 2016. At the conference championships Antonio finished second in both the 100- and 200-meters and also anchored the 4x100 and 4x400 meter relay teams.

Orenga is one of many Hudson residents involved with the Peter Maurin Center. "I owned a business and retired three to four years ago," Orenga said. "I wanted to give back to society."
